Speakers:

Commander Roy Hudson-

Commander Hudson spoke about the Fort Worth Police Department's violent crime initiative. He explained that the FWPD is currently understaffed but has 5 new recruits starting soon. There is currently no solution to the crime in the area without having more officers on patrol. Commander Hudson stated that much of the recent crime was not targeted crime but happened out of convenience with the perpetrators being people from other areas who happened to be passing through. He recommended contacting code compliance, TABC, and the Fire Department when you see parties happening in strip malls. Additional pressure can be put on the owner of the strip mall and our City Council member. When a resident questioned long wait times upon calling 911, Commander Hudson explained that there was a shortage of dispatchers and the city has made adjustments to the staff and now all of the calls that were formerly filtered to the Police department will be routed to the Fire department as well.

Detective Eric Lavigne-

Detective Lavigne spoke about property crimes and catalytic converter theft. He works in the Real Time Crime Center of the FWPD and mentioned the option of adding cameras to public areas of our neighborhood. These cameras have facial recognition software and license plate detection that wait for hits to detect criminals. Each camera runs about \$2500 and we can inquire about this option with NPO Lopez. Detective Lavigne also mentioned a non-profit organization, Act For Justice, which helps to shut down businesses that promote criminal activity. When discussing the issue of catalytic converter theft in our area, he explained that there isn't much that can be done to prevent this problem aside from parking in the garage if you are able to. There are some



caps that can be used for certain models of Toyota vehicles but they are not a foolproof solution. The next best option to parking in your garage would be to set up a driveway camera. Detective Lavigne noted that the department is setting up buy busts to catch the people purchasing stolen catalytic converters, but the establishments they are catching are not reputable businesses.

Billy Rudd-

Billy Rudd is a Crime Prevention Specialist with the FWPD. He noted that Wedgwood East used to have the most active Crime Watch program and recommended that we restart the program. He promoted the idea, "If you see something, say something." as a good means of preventing crime. Mr. Rudd mentioned that the Citizens on Patrol are especially helpful in the evenings and can keep a watchful eye on the neighborhood from their cars and report any crimes that they may witness. Some helpful ways he suggested to keep your home safe are by keeping your porch lights on when it is dark, having home security cameras, adding those cameras to the Community Camera Program, and reporting any street lights you see out to the My Fort Worth app. Mr. Rudd also mentioned that if you see illegal activity, please report it to the police first before posting about it on social media.
